Summary: 75 76 On October 7, 2023, in response to a Hamas attack on Israeli civilians, Israel initiated a complete siege on 77 the Gaza Strip (barring entry of food, water, medicines, and other supplies) as well as a devastating 78 campaign of airstrikes on the densely populated territory, home to more than 2 million civilians (half of 79 whom are children). At the time of writing, a ground invasion by the Israeli military appears imminent. 80 Already, the loss of life and vital infrastructure, not to mention untold physical and mental trauma, have 81 caused a humanitarian crisis in the Gaza Strip that surpasses those created by the five previous assaults on 82 the Gaza Strip. More Palestinian civilians have died since October 7 than were killed in fifty-one days of 83 the 2014 war, which until this past week was the deadliest of the five previous major Israeli military 84 campaigns in Gaza. Today, civilians are being denied access to the most basic social determinants of 85 health (including food, water, education, and housing), are experiencing severe traumatic mental and 86 physical injuries, and have increasingly little access to health care due to bombings, displacement, and the 87 deaths of multiple humanitarian workers. Health care workers from the Gaza Strip have pleaded for the 88 international community to respond as they attempt to continue to treat their patients in desperate 89 circumstances. It is imperative that the public health community speak up during this clear public health 90 crisis. 91 VIII. Rationale for Consideration: 92 As health care and public health professionals, we unequivocally condemn violence against non-93 combatant civilians. International law recognizes attacks on civilians and civilian infrastructure, including 94 health care facilities, as well as purposeful deprivation of food, water, shelter, and medical care, as war

crimes and crimes against humanity. The medical and public health consequences of these forms of

structural and direct violence on civilians are horrendous, of catastrophic levels, and extend well beyond

the acute loss of life in its impact on future generations. Attacks on civilians, infrastructure, and medical

personnel are part of an ongoing, deliberate attempt to undermine health, well-being, and sovereignty in Palestine – a project rooted in settler-colonialism and apartheid.<sup>1,2</sup>

This late breaker is proposed because at the time of writing this policy, Israel and Hamas are engaged in a war that is resulting in thousands of civilian deaths and injuries and the possible destruction of the entire infrastructure of the Gaza Strip. There has also been a serious rise in attacks on Palestinian civilians in the West Bank. Public health professionals and the APHA can have a major impact in mitigating these attacks through education and advocacy to pressure the U.S. government to work with Israel and other nations to end the war, allow humanitarian aid into Gaza, and begin the process of rebuilding.

#### IX. Problem Statement

As public health professionals acting on the ethics of our profession, we state unequivocally that the slaughter or capture of civilians is unconscionable regardless of the perpetrator or the justification. We condemn all attacks on all civilians. We also recognize that the Israeli military occupation of Palestine, the Israeli siege of Gaza and the Israeli apartheid system are forms of violence that have been largely ignored by the international community. Only through addressing systemic injustices can we arrive at a just and peaceful solution, one that will ultimately allow Palestinians and Israelis alike to enjoy a safe and healthy future.

Between Oct. 7, 2023, and the date of this writing (Oct. 18, 2023), Israeli forces have killed more than 3,000 Palestinians in Gaza (including at least 1000 children) and injured 12,500<sup>3</sup>. Israeli casualties are reported as 1,300 fatalities and 4,229 injured. The United Nations estimates that an estimated one million of Palestinians have become displaced in Gaza, with the only plan advanced thus far is to settle them in the Sinai Desert in tents<sup>4</sup>, leading the United Nations to describe these events as a mass ethnic cleansing<sup>5</sup>. Israel has also cut electricity to Gaza and has totally closed the borders so that no water, food, fuel or humanitarian aid of any kind including medical supplies can be transported inside the territory. Although a recent agreement to allow some amount of supply trucks through Egypt has purportedly been reached between Israel and the United States, the level of damage and destruction to vital facilities such as hospitals and clinics will continue to perpetuate a humanitarian crisis and intermittent allowances of tightly restricted supplies are insufficient to meet population needs.

130 As health professionals, we are particularly concerned with the many reported instances of the Israeli 131 military blocking access to health care services. As of Oct. 18, 2023, 112 cases of attacks on health care 132 in the Occupied Palestinian Territories (oPt) have been reported, including violence with heavy weapons, 133 obstruction, arrest or detention of medical personnel, and psychological threats and intimidation<sup>6</sup>. On Oct. 134 17, 2023, the Palestinian Ministry of Health reported approximately 500 dead after a large explosion 135 occurred at the Al Ahli Arab Hospital in the middle of Gaza<sup>7</sup> where hundreds of civilians were taking 136 shelter. An independent investigation is needed to determine the source of the missile. 137 138 The World Health Organization (WHO) has documented more than 136 attacks on health care services in 139 the oPt, including 59 attacks on facilities in the Gaza Strip. Sixteen health workers have been killed since 140 the beginning of hostilities on 7 October. "Israeli bombardments on Gaza have also killed 15 staff of the 141 United Nations Refugee Works Agency (UNRWA) and four Palestine Red Crescent paramedics in an 142 ambulance"8. 143 144 In preparation for a ground invasion, Israel has directed 1.1 million people in Gaza to go 15 miles south<sup>9</sup>, 145 amidst dangerous conditions like continued explosives 10 even among the so- called "safe routes." Israel 146 persisted with its evacuation orders despite the United Nations' assertion that an evacuation of this 147 magnitude, under these conditions, was impossible, particularly for vulnerable people and especially for 148 hospitals<sup>11</sup>. Healthcare facilities cannot, practically and ethically, evacuate patients or cease provision of 149 services<sup>12</sup>. 150 151 As public health professionals, we call on the U.S. government to immediately support a lasting ceasefire, 152 as called on by the United Nations and multiple humanitarian and global health organizations, so that 153 necessary supplies can be delivered to Palestinians and lives can be spared. 154 155 The American Public Health Association promotes an unequivocal belief that health is a human right. In 156 recent years, APHA has asserted that the prevention of genocide (#200030), the health effects of 157 militarism (#8531), the health of refugees (#8531), law enforcement violence (#201811), attacks on 158 healthcare workers (#201910), and health within armed conflict and war (#20095) are public health 159 matters deserving of our attention and action. As an organized body within APHA focused on health 160 justice in Palestine, the Palestine Health Justice Working Group urges APHA, one of the leading global 161 public health organizations, to voice its opposition to Israel's continued assaults on Palestinian health and 162 freedom, as it has in contexts of Iran (#277718), Iraq (#200617), South Africa (#9122), Nicaragua 163 (#8306), and other locations. We urge our public health colleagues to continue to act on the ethics of our

164	profession and speak out against Israeli state-sponsored destruction of Palestinian health, infrastructure,
165	and public health workforce in our organizations and communities.
166	
167	X. Evidence-Based Strategies to Address the Problem
168	
169	Strategy 1: Ceasefire and de-escalation
170	
171	We recognize that the United States, which supplies over \$3.8 billion in military aid to Israel annually and
172	provides tremendous political cover for these actions, has the power to stop this violence at its root by
173	supporting a just resolution. No action in the history of any war could ever justify the mass eviction of 1.1
174	million civilians, as the Israeli government has sought to do to the Palestinian residents of Northern
175	Gaza <sup>9</sup> .
176	
177	Strategy 2: Independent Investigations
178	
179	The Independent International Commission of Inquiry on the Occupied Palestinian Territory by the
180	United Nations was launched Oct. 7, 2023 <sup>13</sup> to examine all those in the region from all sides who violated
181	international law and targeted civilians. As public health professionals, we urge that these independent
182	investigations include the short- and long- term health effects of the recent attacks, including the effects
183	on rates of physical and mental disability related to the physical and emotional trauma of the attacks and
184	the ongoing aggression. These investigations should also examine the charges by Human Rights Watch <sup>14</sup>
185	that Israel used white phosphorus in Gaza and Lebanon on Oct. 10 and 11, 2023, which is against
186	international law.
187	
188	Strategy 3: Humanitarian Corridor
189	
190	The World Health Organization (WHO), with decades of experience dealing with global health
191	catastrophes and emergencies of all sorts, has prepared medical supplies in its logistics hub in Dubai that
192	would suffice to care for more than 300,000 patients with a range of wounds and diseases. WHO has
193	requested the immediate establishment of a humanitarian corridor for the safe delivery to health care
194	facilities in Gaza, while continuing to plead for humanitarian access for life-saving supplies and the
195	delivery of fuel, water, and food. WHO has also called for protection under international humanitarian
196	law for civilians, health workers and health infrastructure; and ultimately, for an end to hostilities and
197	violence. <sup>15</sup>

198	
199	Strategy 4: Protect Civilian Life
200	
201	WHO has echoed the pleas of United Nations General António Gutteres, who has also stated that all
202	hostages in Gaza must be released, and that civilians must not be used as human shields, in line with
203	international humanitarian law such as the Geneva Conventions. Accordingly, Gutteres has called for the
204	protection of civilians on both sides, and specifically demanded that schools, clinics and United Nations
205	premises and personnel must never be targeted. 16
206	
207	XI. Opposing Arguments/Evidence
208	
209	Opposing Argument 1: Israel is defending itself.
210	
211	This is a primary opposing argument suggesting Israel is only exercising a necessary level of force in
212	pursuit of self-defense.
213	
214	Response: Since its creation, Israel's response to any fatal attacks upon them are consistently
215	disproportionate and result in mass casualties of innocent Palestinians living in Gaza and the West Bank.
216	Since October 7th, 2023, critiques of Israel's response by international government leaders are growing
217	and currently include Ireland, Norway, South Africa. These entities, along with nearly every global
218	humanitarian agency, are calling for a ceasefire, citing the widespread destruction of civilian
219	infrastructure in Gaza by Israel (e.g. hospitals, schools, houses of worship), the deaths of Palestinian
220	children (which make up over half of the Gazan population), and the cutting of power, fuel supplies, and
221	water into Gaza <sup>17</sup> . Commenting on Israel's decision to block critical resources from entering into Gaza,
222	the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights points to the war crime of 'collective
223	punishment' outlined in the Geneva Convention <sup>18</sup> by stating "the imposition of sieges that endanger the
224	lives of civilians by depriving them of goods essential for their survival is prohibited under international
225	humanitarian law <sup>19</sup> ." Additionally, the evacuation order of north Gaza, home to almost 1.1 million people
226	fits the description of inhumane acts as defined by the 1973 United Nations International Convention on
227	the Suppression and Punishment of the Crime of Apartheid <sup>20</sup> and 1998 Rome Statute of the International
228	Criminal Court <sup>21</sup> , including denying people the right to leave and to return to their country, and
229	expatriation of landed property.
230	
231	XII. Alternative Strategies: N/A

232	
233	XIII. Action Steps
234	The American Public Health Association (APHA), in pursuit of human rights and health, urges the
235	President, Congress and the Israeli government to call for:
236	
237	(1) an immediate and lasting ceasefire in Gaza;
238	
239	(2) an end to the economic blockade and siege by land, sea and air of Gaza that has facilitated the
240	destruction of the healthcare system and deteriorating health for Palestinians living there.
241	
242	(3) Israel to halt efforts of forced removal and facilitate the return of the 1.1 million Palestinians forced to
243	flee within this round of hostilities, and to fund the repair of Palestinian homes, businesses, and
244	infrastructure, including the (as of Oct. 17, 2023) 8,840 housing units destroyed by Israel and 5,434
245	housing units damaged beyond habitation; 26 health care facilities and 167 education facilities (including
246	20 UN schools, two of which had been used as emergency shelters) <sup>3</sup> .
247	
248	(4) the U.S. government to support independent investigations into, and appropriate responses to, the
249	evacuation order, and to attacks on civilians, healthcare, and healthcare workers, including the bombing
250	of healthcare facilities and hospitals, which are in clear violation of international law and the ethics of
251	public health, such as the Independent International Commission of Inquiry on the Occupied Palestinian
252	Territory by the United Nations.
253	
254	(5) the public health community to join the international community in holding Israel accountable and
255	pushing to end the support of our governments for Israel's control and destruction of Palestinian land and
256	infrastructure; this includes advocating to stop financial and military support.
257	
258	(6) to follow-through on the announcement on 10/18/23 by President Biden of \$100 million for assistance
259	to the Palestinian people.
260	
261	
262	Finally, the APHA asserts to all parties that:
263	(7) the attacks on civilians, infrastructure, and medical personnel are part of an ongoing, deliberate
264	attempt to undermine health, well-being, and sovereignty in Palestine - a project rooted in settler-
265	colonialism and apartheid <sup>2</sup> . The latest assaults on Gaza outstrip any previous attacks in the sheer terror

266	they induce and remain a part of the settler colonial project that undermines health in Palestine. We call	
267	on the public health community to understand it thusly, and to push for a lasting end to Israeli state-	
268	sponsored violence against the Palestinian people, in Israel, in the West Bank, in Jerusalem, and in Gaza.
