APHA Policy on Executive Session

1. Executive Session:

- (A) An executive session may be held for the following reasons only:
 - 1. To discuss issues related to personnel.
 - 2. To discuss issues related to litigation.
 - 3. To discuss proposed or pending real estate transactions.
 - 4. To discuss proposed or ongoing contract negotiations.
 - 5. To discuss criminal investigations.
 - 6. To comply with federal or state law.
 - 7. To discuss membership revocation.
 - 8. To discuss component status or revocation.
 - 9. To discuss voting strategies, policy endorsements, the Joint Policy Committee mark-up session, nominations, and budgets (Sections, SPIGs, Forums, Caucuses, Nominations Committee, Awards Committee, Editorial Boards, ISC, and COA only and their committees).
- (B) Only the Executive Board may enter executive session under 1(A)(1) 1(A)(8). Groups and components not listed in 1(A)(9) may not enter executive session.
- (C) Voting may not occur in an executive session except to leave or to continue the session. A simple majority is required to enter, to continue and to exit executive session.
- (D) Minutes taken during an executive session are available only to members eligible to attend the executive session. [Note: if all meetings in APHA require minutes, leave as is. If minutes are not required in all meetings, add the following "Minutes are required."]
- (E) Request to enter executive session must be included on the agenda and clearly state the justification.
- (F) Only members of the committee or group entering executive session may attend.

2. Open Meetings

- (A) There are no closed meetings in the American Public Health Association except those in Executive Session.
- (B) Groups holding meetings in APHA will operate under the following policy:
 - 1. Provide notice of the meeting at least two weeks before the scheduled meeting date through Connect and the Affiliate online Community. The notice must include the location, agenda, and a contact for questions.

- 2. Allow any member-in-good standing to attend the meeting. If the meeting is being held in-person, APHA is not required to provide teleconferencing or other remote access. Groups may define who is permitted to participate in meetings. Attending a meeting does not imply a right to participate in the meeting.
- 3. A meeting included in the Annual Meeting Program has given notice under 2(B)(1).
- 4. Social gatherings and receptions are not meetings for purposes of 2 and are not covered by this policy.

3. Complaints:

Members who wish to appeal a decision to enter executive session or to file a complaint about this policy should direct their complaint in writing to Governance@apha.org. The Executive Board will review all complaints and make a final determination. The Executive Board may rescind any decisions made by a group improperly in executive session.
